Meeting called to order at 7:00 P.M. by President Gentner.

Members Present: K. Williams, K. Brooks, R. Curtis, T. Gentner, J. Terakedis, D. VanBrunt, S. Robinson (arrived at 7:02 p.m.)

Members Absent: None.

Others Present: S. Head, D. McGee, A. Ellison, D. Behm, R. Johncox, S. Johncox, N. Shoemaker, D. Tison, D. Cherry, R. Raglow, M. Davis.

President Gentner led the Pledge of Allegiance and read the Vision and Mission Statement.

Motion by Brooks to approve the minutes of the September 18, 2017 regular meeting of the Board of Education. Seconded by Terakedis. Motion carried 6-0. (Robinson not in attendance.)

Motion by Curtis to approve the disbursements for the month of September 2017 in the amount of \$1,012,898.93. Seconded by Williams. Motion carried 6-0. (Robinson not in attendance.)

(Steve Robinson arrived at 7:02 p.m.)

Comments from the Audience: Roger Johncox addressed the Board about changing the name of the football stadium from Redfield Stadium to Wildcat Stadium. Other alumni were in attendance. President Gentner stated the Board will take the matter under consideration. Sherry Johncox noted the alumni will pay the cost of making the change.

Building Report: Elementary Principal Marsha Davis updated the Board on Elementary School activities and happenings so far this school year, including: Grants being sought to help purchase playground equipment and supplies; flexible seating/desks to help students focus; Standards-based reporting, technology, curriculum specialist (Gina Gemalsky), Makerspace STEAM lab; essential literacy practices (new Third Grade reading law); Leader in Me training.

Student Representative Report: Mackenzie Johncox gave the Student Representative Report, including: Parent Teacher Conferences will be held on November 2, 2017; 8th grade Halloween decorations for Hidden Lake Gardens; Middle School Carnival October 28, 2017; Homecoming last week; OAC went to an alligator farm; Juniors took the PSAT; upcoming College/Career Fair at Columbia Central.

Motion by Williams to approve the following administrative recommendations to hire: Katelyn Snack, GSRP Lead Teacher and Preschool Director; Craig Teeple and Andrea Young, Bus Drivers. Seconded by Curtis. Motion carried 7-0.

District PA/Bell System bids were discussed. Dennis Tison reviewed the bids and recommended the bid from Sound Engineering of \$26,600 to replace the current 20 year old system. This system is much more flexible and can be modified for different buildings.

Motion by Brooks to move the District PA/Bell System item from Discussion to Action. Seconded by Curtis. Motion carried 7-0.

Superintendent Head reviewed information from the Board Workshop held on October 12, 2017, including: Strategic Plan, curriculum and instruction, grading and reporting practices; District Enrollment, continues to decline with current enrollment at 1,314 partly due to small kindergarten size, and the resulting impact on the budget; MASB Governance – Best Practices will be discussed at the November Board of Education meeting.

Motion by Williams to accept the 2016-2017 Audit presented by Meredith Francis, unmodified opinion with no deficiencies. Seconded by Robinson. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Curtis to adopt the State Aid Operating Notes Resolution as presented. Seconded by Terakedis. Roll call vote: Williams – yes, Brooks – yes, Curtis – yes, Gentner – yes, Terakedis – yes, Van Brunt – yes, Robinson – yes. Motion carried 7-0. (A copy of the Resolution is attached to the original minutes.)

Motion by Curtis to accept the Snow Removal Bid of Green Borders (current provider and low bidder) for the 2017-18 school year. Seconded by Williams. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Brooks to accept the bid of Sound Engineering in the amount of \$26,600 for the District PA/Bell System. Seconded by Curtis. Motion carried 7-0.

Superintendent Report: Superintendent Head noted he will submit his self-evaluation next month and will schedule closed session for evaluation (which would go to open session for evaluation results). LCASB Dinner will be held on November 16, 2017 at the Tech Center. Policy Committee will be scheduled soon. National Honor Society Banquet will be held on November 6, 2017.

School Finance Research Project

Study to "Determine the Cost for Funding Educational Achievement for all Michigan Students (PK-12)"

Executive Summary

September 20, 2017

The Kellogg Foundation awarded a \$100,000 grant to the Oakland Schools Education Foundation on June 30, 2016. The Purpose of the grant was to support the School Finance Research Project (the Project) which would work to ensure that the cost of student achievement for all students in both traditional school districts and charter schools, including at-risk and vulnerable students, students in geographically isolated districts, students in districts of all different enrollment sizes are determined. The first step in the Project was to fully analyze the 2016 state commissioned adequacy study for K-12 education in Michigan and make reports available to all about the strengths and weaknesses of that effort. A road map was then developed to guide the Project work to build on the state funded study results and improve both the validity and the reliability of the cost information produced. A 13 member Project Steering and Technical Committee, a 9 member Advisory Committee and a statewide non-partisan and now 22 member Collaborative representing the private sector, k-12 educators, higher education, policy experts and including former legislators from all across the state were formed. An RFP was issued in Feb. of 2017 for a new Adequacy study using multiple methodologies: "Determining the Cost for Funding Educational Achievement for all Michigan Students (PK-12)" using multiple methodologies. A contractor was selected and the new Adequacy study commenced on May 16, 2017. The Study will be complete and a report issued in Mid-January of 2018. A contractor, Byrum and Fisk Advocacy Communications was engaged to provide expertise to the development of a comprehensive Communication Plan to educate stakeholders statewide. The Plan was promptly developed and implementation began immediately. The Project considers the Communication effort regarding the need for the additional research and the results of the research to be as important as the research itself.

The total Project budget, excluding the \$500,000 of in kind services provided by the 15 member Project Steering and Technical Committee and the Advisory Committee, between July 1, 2016 and March 31, 2018 (21 Months) is \$877,000.

Rationale

The Michigan Education Finance Report issued in June of 2016 was based on a "state funded" Adequacy Study which used only the Successful School District Methodology (SSD). The SSD is one of four commonly accepted methodologies for Adequacy Studies which have evolved over the past 30 years. The Report was a good start but had several weaknesses as a result of contract requirements established by the State of Michigan, particularly in that the study used only one methodology and furthermore a Successful School District was defined primarily on the basis on proficiency on state exams and too little on student growth. This study did not examine charter schools, preschool, geographically isolated districts, the concentration of special needs students, or Career and Technical Education (see a review of the Michigan Education Finance Study and an Analysis of Notably Successful

School Districts at http://www.fundmischools.org/resources/ for details). What was clear from the study is that the School Finance System in Michigan is broken and in need of major reform. Subsequently, in March of 2017, the Governors 21st Century Education Commission report also identified the investment level for pk-12 education to be a serious problem which urgently needed to be addressed. The Project objectives are to build on the State funded study by conducting an Adequacy study using multiple methodologies to identify the cost of student achievement for all students pk to 12 and then to communicate the results broadly to stakeholders and policy makers across the State. As a result of this Project, Michigan will have information from three methodologies representing "the very Best Practice in the United States." The best possible information must be available to support major School Finance Policy reform. This Project will meet that need.

From 2003 to 2014, 25 states conducted Adequacy Studies to guide policy reform and in 23 of the 25 states **multiple methodologies** were used.

The two methodologies currently being used are the Professional Judgment and the Evidence Based methods and are the most frequently used approaches by States in America. The Contractor selected to conduct the research is Augenblich, Palaich and Associates (APA). This firm was also selected by the State for the 2016 study and is a firm that has worked in all 50 states. APA is the nationwide leader in implementing the Professional Judgment method. The ten member research team doing the study also includes another leading school finance research firm, Piccus, Oden and Associates (POA), the firm who actually developed the Evidence Based (EB) Methodology over 20 years ago.

The Adequacy Study now underway will require 20 educator panels to be established to work with the ten member research team. The total number of Michigan educators involved with the panels will be at least 240 and this will include teachers, principals, superintendents, business officials, technology experts and instructional experts from all across the state. The panels include Pre-school, Poverty, English Language learners, Special Education, Career and Technical Education, districts which are geographically isolated, very small, small, moderate and large school districts and a first time in the nation panel just on charter schools. The impact of high concentrations of special needs students will

also be closely examined. The results of the Study delivered in January of 2018 will be communicated to stakeholders and policymakers all across the state. The Study will create the building blocks of information needed to develop a new school finance funding formula designed to bring all students to the state standard for achievement and to be responsive to constantly changing demographics in all school districts and charter schools. Achieving the Projects objective is imperative to informing school finance policy reform, an essential element necessary to improve equity and prosperity for all of Michigan.

The Governors 21st Century Education Commission report in March of 2017 recommended that State **Determine the base funding amount for K-12**—The Commission further recommended that Michigan adopt performance outcomes that are benchmarked against the highest-performing states and nations. If the state is going to be successful in meeting these benchmarks, schools need to be provided with the resources necessary for success. Michigan needs to efficiently distribute resources, and efficient distribution requires a transparent calculation of what it costs to meet performance standards. This Project will do exactly that.

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments and the Metropolitan Affairs Coalition recently issued a report "Providing Quality Education for All Students". This report call for full support to the efforts of the School Finance Research Project.

Furthermore, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction established the "Top 10 in 10 years" Plan which identifies 7 strategic goals including to "reduce the impact of high-risk factors, including poverty, and provide equitable resources to meet the needs of all students to ensure that they have access to quality educational opportunities". This Project will provide the information essential to reaching this goal.

Resolution of Support: School Finance Research Collaborative Onsted Community Schools, Lenawee County, Michigan

WHEREAS, the Michigan Constitution states that the legislature shall maintain and support a system of free public elementary and secondary schools as defined by law, and

WHEREAS, Michigan ranks 32nd in student achievement nationwide, according to recent research; and

WHEREAS, the Governor's 21st Century Education Commission states that the urgency could not be greater regarding the falling K-12 performance, further stating that Michiganders underperform their peers, ranking 41st on fourth-grade reading performance nationally, that it is simply not true that these unacceptable statewide outcomes are a result of changing demographics as Michigan's higher-income and white students are also among the worst performing in the country and that Michigan is one of only three states that has seen a decline in fourth-grade reading achievement since 2003; and

WHEREAS, the Commission further stated that Michigan needs to efficiently distribute resources, and efficient distribution requires a transparent calculation of what it costs to meet performance standards, that students with greater educational needs should be provided with additional resources where needed to have an equal chance of meeting the performance standards; and

WHEREAS, in 2016 the State of Michigan conducted a comprehensive statewide cost study (Adequacy Study) to determine the sufficient resources per pupil to provide a public education that enables a pupil to demonstrate successful completion, in terms of proficiency, of all of the credit requirements of the Michigan merit standard and to determine whether public resources being committed to public education are distributed in such a way that all children have an equal opportunity to succeed in school; and

Whereas, the State funded Adequacy Study produced and provided valuable information but used only one methodology and did not fully examine special education costs due to data availability issues, did not examine preschool, charter schools, career and technical education, the impact of high concentrations of special needs students and the cost challenges faced by geographically isolated schools and or very small school districts; and

WHEREAS, the way we fund Michigan's public schools is fundamentally broken; and that Michigan needs to develop funding formulas that efficiently and effectively distribute these resources to the proper entities to support student success.

WHEREAS, we must reexamine our approach so ALL students, regardless of their circumstances, can achieve and succeed; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative is a broad-based, diverse and bipartisan group of business leaders and education experts, from Metro Detroit to the U.P., who agree it's time to determine the cost of student achievement for all students PK-12 and then change how our schools are funded; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative has brought together top industry experts to reexamine our approach to how we fund Michigan's schools to fully prepare ALL students for jobs and success; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative is supporting Michigan's first comprehensive school adequacy study using multiple methodologies to determine the cost of educating a student; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative has hired the nation's top two school finance research firms which have a proven ability to combine the data generated from multiple research approaches to examine cost issues associated with key factors, including preschool, poverty, special education, Career and Technical Education, English Language Learners, at-risk students, and schools that are geographically isolated; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative study will be the only statewide study ever performed to include a statewide panel to examine all the costs faced by charter schools; and

WHEREAS, the research team will work with 20 educator panels involving more than 240 Michigan educators including teachers, teacher leaders, principals, superintendents, school business officials, special education directors and other specialists; and

WHEREAS, adequacy studies have been performed in more than 30 other states over the past 15 years, with over 90% of these studies using multiple methodologies, as Step One in considering any comprehensive school reform; and

WHEREAS, many states have conducted multiple adequacy studies to make sure lawmakers have the very best, most reliable and valid information on what it costs to educate a student; and

WHEREAS, the School Finance Research Collaborative adequacy study is expected to be completed in early 2018, and will provide lawmakers and the public with the best, most accurate and most reliable information on what it truly costs to educate ALL Michigan students.

Note: Shared understanding of terms and practices is essential for effective school district governance. Key terms are defined within the Glossary at the back of this document. To alert the reader, these terms are underlined throughout the text.

Introduction

Why do citizens serve on boards of education? School board members consistently report coming to service on a school board because they care deeply about doing the right things for children. In serving, school board members give countless hours to the governance of public schools and open themselves up to the scrutiny and, sometimes, acrimony of their fellow citizens. While school board service is most certainly not for the timid or uninformed, it is an excellent means of impacting the lives of children in one's community. There is, after all, a correlation between the work of school boards and student achievement. But, for the school board's impact on student achievement to be positive, the service must be guided by principles that support excellent outcomes for students and are reflective of research-based practices of effective school boards.

The Board of Education Governance Standards are intended for use by local and intermediate school boards as well as individual school board members. They were developed by school board members for school board members to provide a shared framework for effective school district governance. By design, the Governance Standards are in simple terms so as to be easily understood and promote understanding across the board table and throughout communities.

Developing the Governance Standards was relatively straightforward work—research has benchmarked the practices of effective school boards, and MASB has access to the perspective and experiences of literally thousands of school board members and superintendents. The more complex work related to the Governance Standards must occur at school board tables across the state—in *living* the Standards—in holding ourselves and fellow board members accountable to the Standards. We must be disciplined in *our own* governance behaviors. We must respect our board colleagues enough to expect them to be disciplined in their governance behaviors. And we must have the courage to speak up when the performance of individuals or the board is not in alignment with the Standards. This is the challenge we must overcome if we are to do the right things for children.

Board of Education Governance Standards

Guiding Principles of the Board of Education:

<u>Accountability | Commitment to Learning | Inclusivity | Stewardship | Transparency | Vision-Driven</u>

• The Board of Education, in cooperation with the superintendent and <u>stakeholders</u>, establishes and commits to a <u>vision</u> for the school district that emphasizes high expectations for achievement of all students and quality instruction.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 1.a. Has the Board of Education formally adopted a <u>district plan</u> that includes a concise <u>vision</u> statement?
- **1.b.** Were <u>stakeholders</u> engaged in the district planning process?
- **1.c.** Does the <u>district plan</u> include nonnegotiable goals related to student achievement and quality instruction?
- 1.d. Are school improvement or related turnaround efforts aligned to the district plan?
- 1.e. Has the Board of Education adopted a system to monitor progress toward goals?
- 1.f. Are resources aligned to the district plan?
- 1.g. Does the Board of Education proactively address barriers to implementing the <u>vision</u> even when doing so may be unpopular? (Such as with budget cuts, building closures, etc.)
- 1.h. Does the Board of Education establish goals for its performance based upon the district plan?
- 1.i. Are decisions of the Board of Education guided by the district plan and related goals?

② The Board of Education governs in a manner that is dignified and worthy of trust.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 2.a. Does the Board of Education demonstrate a unity of purpose and articulate a common vision for the district?
- 2.b. Is school district business conducted in an ethical, civil and responsible manner?
- 2.c. Does the Board of Education demonstrate knowledge of school district governance, research-based practices in education and school finance, as well as school and labor law?
- 2.d. Does the Board of Education govern with board-adopted policies and procedures?
- **2.e.** Has the Board of Education adopted a budget based on realistic projections reflecting expenses that are less than income?
- **2.f.** Do the interactions and decisions of the Board of Education serve as examples of effective and responsible leadership for the district's students?

The Board of Education is <u>accountable</u> to the school district community.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 3.a. Is the Board of Education knowledgeable of the students, families and community it serves including factors such as conditions that impact learning and desired outcomes?
- 3.b. Does the Board of Education operate in an open and transparent manner?
- 3.c. Prior to deliberating, does the Board of Education inform itself by listening to a diverse range of views from around the board table as well as across the community it serves?
- **3.d.** Is progress toward goals and student performance regularly reported to the community?
- 3.e. Is the Board of Education's performance evaluated on a regular basis with the use of a <u>valid</u> and <u>reliable</u> assessment (internally, externally or both) and reported to the community?
- **3.f.** Has the Board of Education put policies in place that support successful implementation of the <u>district plan</u>?
- 3.g. Does the Board of Education's governance of the school district demonstrate due concern with regard to financial and legal matters?

1 The Board of Education holds the superintendent <u>accountable</u> for creating the outcomes identified in the school <u>district plan.</u>

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- **4.a.** Does the Board of Education provide policies and systems for oversight of district resources, infrastructure and compliance?
- **4.b.** Does the Board of Education receive regular reports regarding progress toward district goals?
- **4.c.** Does the Board of Education monitor student academic progress based on assessments that are <u>valid</u> and <u>reliable</u>?
- 4.d. Has the Board of Education established clear expectations for the superintendent, as well as the means and timeline on which the superintendent is to be evaluated?
- **4.e.** Does the Board of Education actively participate in the support, development and evaluation of the superintendent?
- **4.f.** Does the Board of Education place an emphasis on continuous improvement despite challenging circumstances?
- 4.g. Has the Board of Education established quality instruction and the development of master teachers as critical district priorities to guide the superintendent's work?
- **4.h.** Does the board spend more time on policies to improve student achievement and monitoring progress and less time on operational issues?



Individual Board Member Governance Standards

Guiding Principles of the Individual School Board Member:

<u>Advocacy | Civility | Courage | Empathy | Inquiry</u> <u>Integrity | Regard for Authority of the Board | Selflessness</u>

The individual school board member is motivated by and focuses on what is in the best interest of all students.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 1.a. Does the board member primarily concern him/herself with the goals that have been identified in the district plan?
- 1.b. Does the board member demonstrate concern for all students in action, deed and decisions?
- 1.c. Is the board member able to set aside personal issues and participate as a member of a board?
- 1.d. Does the board member maintain confidentiality when expected to do so?
- 1.e. Does the board member advocate for viable and effective PK-12 public education? (Such as by contacting legislators about PK-12 issues, legislation, state education funding, etc.; talking with parents and community members about how they can positively advocate for and participate in their district, etc.)
- The individual school board member believes in the importance of and actively engages in lifelong learning.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 2.a. Is the board member actively engaged in learning new concepts, skills or best practices?
- **2.b.** Is the board member willing and able to develop competency in matters related to school governance such as school finance and policy, as well as school and labor law?
- **2.c.** Does the board member seek out and engage in <u>learning</u> opportunities to improve his/her ability to serve effectively on a Board of Education?
- **8** The individual school board member understands and respects both the <u>authority</u> and responsibilities of the Board of Education.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:


3.a. Does the board member act in accordance with Michigan law, which does not vest individual board members with any type of independent legal authority?

- 3.b. Does the board member demonstrate a clear grasp of the roles and responsibilities of the Board of Education and the superintendent?
- 3.c. Does the board member follow established policies and procedures?
- **3.d.** Does the board member support decisions of the Board of Education after a vote is taken regardless of his/her individual position prior to the vote?
- 3.e. Is the board member able to identify, discuss and resolve conflict with respect and civility?
- **3.f.** Does the board member come to meetings having read the background materials and adequately prepared to address items on the agenda?
- **3.g.** Does the board member demonstrate understanding of and respect for school district structure and protocols?
- 3.h. Does the board member declare and avoid engaging in conflicts of interest?

4 The individual school board member approaches school governance work with a spirit of <u>inquiry</u>.

Questions to evaluate or prompt successful adoption of this standard include:

- 4.a. Is the board member open to discussion without prejudging issues?
- 4.b. Does the school board member seek clarity and understanding before forming an opinion?
- **4.c.** Does the board member actively seek common ground and work to foster productive relationships with all other members of the Board of Education as well as the superintendent?
- 4.d. Does the board member seek out and respect perspectives that are different than his/her own?



Glossary

Accountability is accepting responsibility for ensuring the conditions are in place for positive student outcomes and learning to occur.
Advocacy is actively supporting that which is in the best interest of Michigan's public school students.
Civility is about more than just politeness, although politeness is a necessary first step. It is about disagreeing without disrespect, seeking common ground as a starting point for dialogue about differences, listening past one's preconceptions, and teaching others to do the same. Civility is the hard work of staying present even with those with whom we have deep-rooted and fierce disagreements. It is political in the sense that it is a necessary prerequisite for civic action. But it is political too in the sense that it is about negotiating interpersonal power such that everyone's voice is heard, and nobody's is ignored. ³
Commitment to learning describes a dedication to the belief that everyone can learn and that lifelong learning is key to an individual's ability to create positive outcomes.
School board members become aware of information of which unauthorized disclosure could be prejudicial to the interest of the district and/or illegal.
Courage is the mental or moral strength to venture, persevere and withstand danger, fear or difficulty.4
At minimum, a district plan lays out the objectives a district intends to accomplish including the steps it will take to accomplish those objectives as well as the timeframe and metrics that will be used to evaluate progress. See Strategic Plan for the optimal alternative.
Empathy is the capacity to understand, be aware of, be sensitive to and vicariously experience the feelings, thoughts and experience of another. ⁵
Inclusivity is the policy of including people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalized. This includes board members, stakeholders and students.
Integrity is the concept of consistency of one's actions, values, methods, measures, principles, expectations and outcomes.
Inquiry is an approach to understanding that is constructed in the process of people working and conversing together as they pose and solve problems, making discoveries and testing new knowledge in the course of shared activity.8

Regard for the authority of the board is the ability of an individual board member to respect and support the vote of the board of education even if his/her position was contrary to the decision.
The extent to which a measurement gives results that are very consistent.9
Selflessness is putting the needs and concerns of others ahead of one's self.
Individuals and groups who have an interest in the welfare of a community's children and public school district including but not limited to district residents, students, business owners/operators, district staff members, union leadership, etc.
Stewardship is the careful and responsible management of the school district's resources including finances, facilities, human resources, etc.
A strategic plan is a document that empowers school districts to plan for continuous change and is used to communicate with the entire school community the Board of Education's vision for the district, goals related to making that vision a reality and the actions needed to achieve those goals, as well as related support materials such as timelines and measurements. It is established via a process that engages stakeholders in assessing the internal and external environments, analyzes the implications or relevant trends, and identifies effective strategies for achieving the desired future state of the school district.
Transparency describes a board's obligation to share information with citizens. Information on how officials conduct the public business and spend axpayers' money must be readily available and easily understood. 12
Validity of an assessment is the degree to which it measures what it is supposed to measure. 13
A vision describes in detail the desired future state of a school district. It announces to staff members, parents and students where a district is heading and why they should take the trip with you. 14
Vision-driven describes a board that, in partnership with the superintendent and stakeholders, establishes a shared vision and plans for the school district o attain that vision. ¹⁵
